

Youth Remanded In Shooting Incident

A 17-year-old youth arrested in connection with a shotgun wounding of two other youths in East Kildonan early Saturday morning has been remanded in Winnipeg juvenile court until next Tuesday.

The youth's lawyer requested the remand in order to conduct further investigations. The youth, who was released on \$5,000 bail, faces two charges of wounding with intent.

The shooting occurred just four days after Acting Mayor Tony Reid told East Kildonan Council that the Police Force should be brought up to full strength immediately "as it was becoming apparent residents were not even safe on the streets."

Acting Mayor Reid related to Council an incident which took place recently where two couples stopped at an East Kildonan restaurant.

While one man went inside to make a purchase, a youth took out a knife and ran it alongside the car.

When the driver got out to protest, he was set upon by a number of boys. While some held the door of the restaurant closed to prevent the first man from getting outside to assist his friend, other teenagers knocked him to the sidewalk, kicking him to the body and face to the extent that he had to be conveyed to hospital by ambulance.

"There's something drastic-

ally wrong in East Kildonan," said Acting Mayor Reid.

The police force is three men short of full strength.
